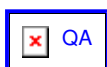


Most likely, you nested tags and closed them in the wrong order. For example <p>...</p> is not acceptable, as must be closed before <p>. Acceptable nesting is: <p>...</p>

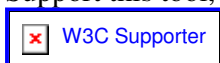
Another possibility is that you used an element which requires a child element that you did not include. Hence the parent element is "not finished", not complete. For instance, in HTML the <head> element must contain a <title> child element, lists (ul, ol, dl) require list items (li, or dt, dd), and so on.

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
